- Description*                    JESC and the EOF Province have been working together to develop a carbon footprint measurement tool for organisations and for Jesuit communities. The tool has been tested in more than 10 Jesuit communities during the past months. The first results will be presented to the participants. This carbon measurement tool is part of the ecological conversion road map of the EOF Province. This global strategy will also be presented and discussed with the participants.

- Description*                    Nacho Esteve García, Head Communications and Campaigns from Fundación Entreculturas and Christoph Klotz, Fundraising Coordinator from JRS-Europe give an insight into how individual donors fundraising and institutional grants fundraising work. As part of their presentation, they will showcase how the social network of the Jesuits could mobilize additional resources for our work on the implementation of the UAPs. The UAPs provide a unique opportunity and pathway to collaborate in the coming years on cross-cutting topics such as Youth, Environmental issues, Migration and others among the Jesuit network. The workshop will have 3 parts:
- Part 1: presentation 2x 10 minutes
- Fundación Entreculturas: How to build an Individual donors database and how to engage with your audience through various communication channels (social media, web, events) to grow your base of supporters. JRS-Europe: How to approach private foundations and public entities, and raise grants that finance your projects, or even serve as a core support for your institution.
- Part 2: 4-5 Working groups 30 minutes
- In this 2nd part, we propose an exchange of experiences among participants on how they fundraise for their organizations or the wider network of Jesuit NGOs. A more general question is, what could participants apply in their own organisation from what they have heard during the presentations, in order to

promote the Universal Apostolic Preferences. In case that already some collaborations as a result of the Conference have been agreed, participants could reflect also on how to use the presented fundraising tools in order to mobilize resources for the outcomes of the Conference.
